Changes at Our Barron Office



Arizona Sunshine Pie

Juice of 1 large lemon or two smaller lemons
4 eggs
1 stick butter
1 tsp. vanilla
1 ½ c. sugar
1 unbaked pie crust
Whipped cream



In blender or food processor blend together lemon chunks, eggs, butter, vanilla and sugar until mixture is smooth and creamy. It should be fairly runny. Pour into unbaked pie crust. Bake in 350 oven for 40 minutes.


If crust becomes too brown, cover gently with foil and finish baking. Serve with dollop of cream.

The Magic of Monarch Butterflies



Member Cindy Sesolak has been fascinated with the Monarch Butterflies from a young age. In 2019, she raised 52 butterflies and tagged 24. This winter, she had the opportunity to experience the Monarchs in a mountain range west of Mexico City. Cindy remarked, "This was an incredible trip. Seeing hundreds of butterflies flying from the trees, making a soft sound, was amazing." She noted that the participants had to be silent when they found the butterflies.


The Migration of the Monarch

The Monarch butterflies look for protein from fall wildflowers, such as goldenrods and asters in preparation for their flight to Mexico. When they arrive in Mexico, the fat that they have left must carry them through nine months. The Monarchs make their home in the Oyamel Fir, where their metabolism slows, and fat is consumed. They do need water, so they travel to small ravines. Once the temperatures warm, the

butterflies mate and head to Texas in search of milkweed.

The Monarch Watch Tagging Program helps understand the Monarch's fall migration and their origins. Cindy commented, "In Mexico, we found Monarchs tagged from Nebraska, Ohio, Ontario, Illinois, Iowa, New York, Kansas, and Wisconsin.

*Condensed Board Minutes January 30, 2020

- Director Helm gave the treasurer's report, with comments by Manager Sloan. A report of vouchers for the month was presented as part of the board packet as follows: #97189 thru #97301 of CCF Bank was in the amount of \$209,446 and capital credit estate checks in the amount of \$34,554. Director Helm reported on activity of total receipts in the office - \$3,485,115; total receipts by wire and ACH - \$1,758,117; disbursements by ACH, EFT, wire - \$4,675,244; transfer of funds was made for payroll - \$282,618 and power bill paid 01/29/2020 in the amount of \$2,457,421.
- A membership list of 55 was presented and approved without objection by the board.
- Form 219 summarizing construction activity for the past month in the amount of \$910,451.25 was presented for approval, and included new services - \$20,196.16; change jobs - \$8,252.68; miscellaneous - \$882,002.41 and 4 retirements. The Form 219 stood approved as presented.
- Outages year-to-date stand at 432,670 consumer hours off, which is 884.66% above 2018 hours of 43,941. Overtime year-to-date is 6,051.75 hours, which is 73.78% above 2018 hours of 3,482.50.
