Rules of Order for Official Business Meeting

- 1. The meeting will be conducted in accordance with the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised and under the following special Rules of Order.
- 2. Members wishing to speak are to give their names and the districts in which they are members.
- 3. During nomination and election proceedings for directors, candidates will be allowed to speak for two minutes. One member supporting his/her candidacy will also be allowed to speak for two minutes.
- 4. Resolutions must have been submitted to the Resolutions Committee for consideration, as required by previous notice, and mailed to all members for action at the annual meeting. This does not preclude members from making simple motions from the floor.
- 5. Only members may be allowed to speak for two minutes on each issue and for one time only, except that an additional two minutes may be granted by unanimous consent.
- 6. No signs or handouts will be permitted within the building of the place of the meeting, except such handouts as required for the official conduct of the annual meeting. No handouts made available outside of the building will use the name of the cooperative, its letterhead or logo to imply that the cooperative supports or opposes any candidate for director or resolution.
- 7. No demonstrations shall be held within the building of the place of the meeting.

Minutes of the 84th Annual Meeting

The 84th Annual Meeting of Barron Electric Cooperative was held on Thursday, August 20, 2020 at the Stardust Drive-In Theater, Chetek, Wisconsin. Registration of members began at 5:30 p.m.

The meeting was called to order by the President, Randy Cook, at 6:00 p.m. President Cook recognized the veterans and thanked them for their service. A prayer was said by President Cook before the start of the business portion of the meeting. The minutes of the meeting were to be recorded by the cooperative's Executive Secretary, Jennifer Horstman.

Member Michael Baker moved to adopt the Rules of Order for the Official Business Meeting, as printed on Page 2 of the Annual Report. The motion was seconded and carried by a two-thirds show of voting cards.

Jennifer Horstman, Executive Secretary of the Cooperative, read the official notice of the 84th Annual Meeting as it appeared in the cooperative's August 2020 issue of News for You that was mailed to each member during the last week of July 2020.

The minutes of the 83rd Annual Meeting were approved on April 24, 2019 at the regular scheduled meeting of the Board of Directors. The approved minutes were printed on pages 3 and 10 of the Annual Report. President Cook addressed the membership for approval of assigning the Board of Directors to approve the 84th Annual Meeting minutes at their next regular scheduled board meeting. There were no objections.

President Cook conducted the election of directors for Districts 8, 2 & 4 beginning at 6:05 p.m. Jill Washkuhn was announced as the head teller. President Cook

explained the qualifications to become a director as described in the Bylaws of Barron Electric Cooperative.

District 8 had two candidates nominated by petition, Bill Effertz and Tara Young. There being no further nominations, the nominations were closed. Each candidate spoke on their behalf for election as director in District 8. Joe Prell spoke on behalf of Bill Effertz.

District 2 had one candidate nominated by petition, Timothy Kessler. Timothy Kessler spoke on his behalf for election as director in District 2. There being no further nominations, the nominations were closed. Timothy Kessler was elected director for District 2 by a majority of voting cards.

District 4 had one candidate nominated by petition, Scott

Warwick. Scott Warwick spoke on his behalf for election as director in District 4. There being no further nominations, the nominations were closed. Scott Warwick was elected director for District 4 by a majority of voting cards.

President Cook called on Director Nelson to assume the Chair and conduct the meeting for the Bylaw portion of the Annual Meeting.

Director Nelson stated since the Bylaw amendments are scattered throughout the Bylaws, and they involve more than one article or section, Roberts Rule of Order indicates that they should be considered seriatim, that is by parts. Director Nelson reviewed each Bylaw amendment with the membership.

Our Power Supplier

Barron Electric buys all of its power from Dairyland Power Cooperative, an electric generation and transmission cooperative. In 2020, Dairyland's Board of Directors approved a goal of 50% reduction in carbon dioxide intensity rate (over 2005 levels) by 2030. In January 2021, the Tatanka Ridge Wind Farm began operation. Dairyland has a power purchase agreement to receive renewable wind energy from a 52-megawatt portion of the wind farm. Dairyland also has a Purchase Power Agreement with Ranger Solar for a future addition of 149 MW from the Badger State Solar Facility.



Dairyland Power has a power purchase agreement with Tatanka Ridge Wind, LLC for 52 MW of renewable energy.

As a Board, we are grateful to you our members and employees for being understanding of the changes Barron Electric Cooperative made to our way of conducting business as a result of COVID-19. Through it all, customer service and the safety of everyone remained **Barron Electric** Cooperative's focus as we worked to meet the needs of each member and business on our lines.

Barron Electric Cooperative's mission statement is not only our guiding principle it is also the measuring stick of our success or failure. Our mission statement reads, "Barron Electric Cooperative is a member-owned business that safely provides energy, products, and services to improve the quality of the life in the area we serve." Having said that, let us look at some highlights over the past year since we last met.

Cashback Credits This past year, Barron Electric returned \$1.1 million dollars in capital credits to over 16,000 members who have been on our lines for 20 or more years. Because of COVID-19, we were unable to hold cooperative month events, so instead of receiving the customary capital credit check, members

received a credit on their August 2020 billing statement. The Board has decided to again this year (2021) apply capital credits to your August energy bill. The Barron Electric Cooperative Board also approved returning more than \$1.4 million dollars, a combination of excess margins received from Dairyland Power Cooperative, Barron Electric's wholesale power supplier, and from margins generated by Barron Electric Cooperative to our members. The credit was placed on the December 2020 bill statement and done to help members offset financial challenges caused by COVID-19.

I want to thank Dallas Sloan for his nearly 37 years of dedicated service to Barron Electric Cooperative and his unwavering dedication to ensuring that Barron Electric had the highest safety standards among

all electric cooperatives. His concern for employees, members and electric cooperatives in general was notable to everyone who worked with him. Best wishes to Dallas in his retirement, may he and his wife Diane be blessed in this chapter of their lives. With Dallas's retirement, the Board of Directors hired an Interim Manager in Peter Olson, who had retired from

WHEREAS, it is the responsibility of the Barron Electric Cooperative Board of Directors to review the Bylaws and make suggested changes in the best interest of the cooperative, and its members, and;

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors recommends the following amendments to the membership Bylaws:

• Article I, Section 8. "Membership Fees"

The membership fee shall beset by the board of directors inany amount, including zero, butnot to exceed Five Dollars (\$5.00), the payment of which shall makethe member eligible for service. The Board of Directors may from time to time establish a reasonable membership fee, the payment of which shall be one of the conditions of membership to the Cooperative.

• Article III, Section 1, "Annual Meeting"

The annual meeting of the members shall be held not less than

two months, nor more than ten months from the close of the calendar year. beginning with the year 1980.

• Article III, Section 3, "Notice of Members' Meetings"

Written, electronic, or printed notice stating the place, day and hour of the meeting, and in case of a special meeting, the purpose or purposes for which the meeting is called, shall be delivered not less than seven (7) days nor more than thirty (30) forty (40) days before the date of the meeting, either personally, electronically, by mail, by or at the direction of the secretary, or by the persons calling the meeting, to each member.

• Article III, Section 6, "Order of Business"

The order of business at the annual meeting of the members, and so far as possible at all other meetings of the members, shall be essentially as follows:

(a) Call of the roll. Business Meeting Called to Order by President.

> (b) Adoption of Rules of Order

• Article IV, Section 3, "Qualifications" No person shall be eligible to become or remain a board member of the Cooperative who:

(a) is not a member and bona fide resident in the areaserved of the district and on premises served by the Cooperative at his or her primary residence, and that residence is within the director district which he or she has been nominated or elected to represent;

(e) while a director or during the five years preceding election or appointment as a director has pursued any litigation against the Cooperative or any of its employees or directors, or who is in default on any obligation owed to the Cooperative at the time of election or appointment.

• Article IV, Section 4, "Nominations and Electors"

Directors shall be elected so as to provide for one director from each such division on the board of directors. provided that any-director elected prior to the effective date of this action for a fixed term may continue to serve until the expiration of such fixed term without reference to the districting provisions contained herein.

• Article V, Section 4, "Notice" Notice of the time, place and purpose of any special meeting of the board of directors shall be given at least three (3) days previous thereto, by written notice, delivered electronically, personally or mailed, to each director at their last known address.

• Article VI, Section 2, "Election and Term of Office"

The officers shall be nominated and elected by ballot, annually by and from the board of directors at the meeting of the board of directors held immediately after the annual meeting of the members.

• Article XI, Section 8, "Subscription to Wisconsin REC News"

The Cooperative, through action of its board of directors may in the name and behalf of each member of the Cooperative, subscribe for the REC News Wisconsin Electric Cooperative Association's news publication.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Barron Electric Cooperative Board of Directors hereby recommends these amendments to the Cooperative Bylaws to the membership for approval on March 28, 2020 at the 84th Annual Meeting.

Director Nelson asked for questions regarding the bylaw amendments. Hearing none, all those in favor of the proposed bylaw amendments were asked to show their voting cards. Any opposed were to show their voting cards. The amendments to the bylaws carried by majority of voting cards.

Director Nelson moved to authorize the Secretary to correct article and section designations, punctuation and cross-references, and to make such other technical and conforming changes as may be necessary to reflect the intent of the organization in connection with these amendments to the Bylaws. The motion carried.

With voting of the Bylaw amendments complete, President Cook resumed his position as Chair of the meeting.

The tellers report of District 8 Director election is as follows:

Number of votes cast was 232.

Votes necessary for election was 116. Mr. Effertz received 129 votes. Mrs. Young received 84 votes. Ineligible votes recorded were 19.

A majority of votes was reached for one candidate as specified under Barron Electric Cooperative bylaws. Mr. Effertz was elected director of District 8.

Increasing the Number of High School Scholarships

The Board of Directors moved to increase the number of scholarships awarded to graduating seniors in our service area, from one \$1,000 scholarship per school district to two \$1,000 scholarships per school district. The funds for the scholarships come from unclaimed capital credits.

2020 Kilowatt Hour Sales There was a slight decrease in residential kilowatt hour sales from 165,982,239 kilowatts sold in 2019 to 162,679,464 kilowatt hour sales sold in 2020. Seasonal sales saw an increase for the second year in a row, with an increase in kilowatt hour sales of nearly ten percent over last year. Seasonal kilowatt hour sales were 37,937,058 in 2020 compared to 34,541,258 kilowatt hours sold in 2019.

It has been a privilege to serve as your board president. On behalf of the entire Board of Directors, I am happy to say we as a board believe the state of Barron Electric Cooperative is good and well.
